One of the main parts of Girls and Boys state is the concentration of politics and government actions, from the local communities to our federal republic, commentators are not far with voicing their opinions. 2021 Girls State Poll

While discussing with various Girls Staters their opinions on the poll results, there was a great amount of concern that the data collected was inconsistent with Girls Staters views and seemed to lack the diversity existing within the Girls State program.

While the poll states that over 61% of citizens claim to be liberal, about 30% declared themselves moderate, with only 11% labeling themselves conservative. Some Staters questioned whether these results suggested that Staters claiming to be moderate responded with fear that if claiming conservatism, would be overpowered, even silenced, by liberals.

Another area where interviewees examined data was for the question about Girls Staters political activism. Ruby, from Unity, was surprised to see that only about 16% of citizens believed themselves to be politically active, with 77% considering themselves politically aware. Ruby felt that from her experience participating in conversations with her fellow citizens, girls Staters seemed very informed and educated on politically related current events.

Between those interviewed, the greatest amount of concern was toward the lack of individuals active in the poll. Girls Staters questioned whether the reason for inconsistencies within the data were related to this lack of citizens involved in the acquiring of the data. Does this inconsistent data threaten the future of the Girls State program and the directors perception of participants?

Carter Zielinski, hailing from t6, sat down with The Citizen to lend us his ideas and reactions. Carter's emotions were on stage when consulting the polls on political parties, surprised that a whopping 43 Staters had aligned with this, assuming that there were more Republicans.

On the other hand, there was no considerable reception to the data showing that most people did not think of Donald Trump favorably. From both Republicans and Democrats, this was the same.

Continuing on with the surprising results, Carter was caught off guard with the polls showing that 40% of students believed that people should be required to stand for the national anthem.

Wrapping things up, cell phone usage as young as 6 years old was an astonishment from all. Carter mentioned that he himself had obtained his phone at the age of 13, creating a 7 year difference.

Further down the poll page, Zielinski himself confessed that he was a part of the percentage that were not following the news previously before Boy's State. Around 18% did not. At the top, a steady 50 people had said they follow CNN, comparatively Fox News came in second with 43 students.

With the amount of polls that were filled out, the main takeaway was the representation of democrats or liberals. All in all, Carter explained that he felt and believed that Boy's State was mostly conservative or republican, with some from the other side. With this poll, we can say there is still some more information that has laid uncovered, until now.
